Project – Empowering Children and Young people (ECY)

Human Development Index is a composite measure of a country's average achievements in three basic aspects of human development namely health, knowledge and standard of living. India ranks 134th position out of 193 countries globally (2023-2024 report by UNDP). HDI is was created to emphasize / re-emphasize that people and their capabilities should be the ultimate criteria for assessing the development of a country and not economic growth. Way forward in addressing inequities is intersectionality which is clearly highlighted by HDI.

Education is the deliberate, systematic, and sustained effort to transmit , provoke or acquire knowledge, values, attitudes , skills or sensibilities as well as any learning that results from the effort. (Cremin, Public Education p 27) . This broad based definition makes education as a purposeful activity. Often Education and social change are interwoven. Education imparts knowledge, skills, attitudes, values shaping the social consciousness of an individual. Education acts as an agent in bridging societal divides, promoting critical thinking & civic participation, empowering marginalized groups. In our country, education disparities has no bounds. Not one but various factors lead to educational inequity in India. Factors such as infrastructure, class, caste, religion, language, gender inequality, discrimination based on gender identity, discrimination based on sexuality identity and so on.

Unified District Information System for Education (UDISE) data for 2023-2024 reveals girls and boys dropping out at preparatory and middle school at almost same percent whereas boys dropping out in secondary classes are more compared to girls. This data leaves out gender non-conforming children, transgender & gender diverse children.

Empowering Children & Young people as a sustained project of UKT originated because of the struggles of the founder, director and significant other volunteers of our trust. Though we have not brought immense change in the socio-economically disadvantaged groups, we were able to bring in change in few families whose only source of income was through menial labour. The parents of about 17 children chose to take the empowerment path to free their children from systemic injustices by imparting them with education. We at Urimai Kural Trust, raised funds and paid fees directly from out trust account to 6 children. We also helped parents fundraise and pay fees for 10 children and 1 young person who is doing her engineering in Jeppiar University.

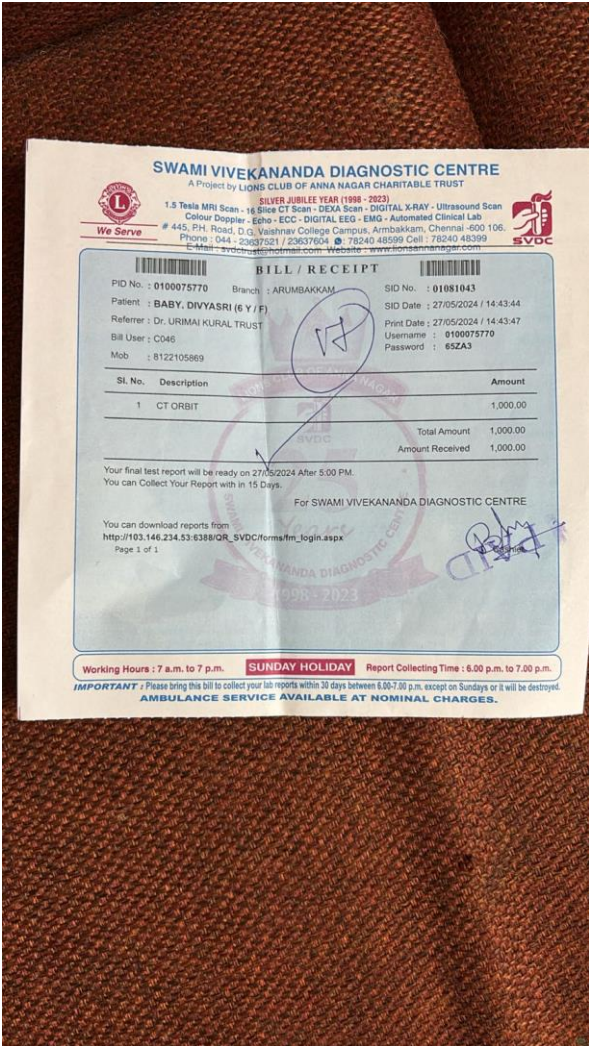

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Health as defined by WHO is a state of complete physical, mental and social well-being and not merely the absence of disease or infirmity. The enjoyment of the highest attainable standard of health is one of the fundamental rights of every human being without distinction of race, caste, class, gender, sexuality, economic or social condition. The intersectionality between health, education and standard of living is clearly explained under HDI. Right to Health is a fundamental right under Article 21 of our Constitution. That being said, right to health still remains a distant dream for many marginalized communities. Urimai Kural supported one such child from a marginalized community with her CT Orbit scan which costs Rs.5000 to Rs.10000 generally. Urimai Kural Trust helped the parent figure out a lab which offered the same scan at a subsidised cost of Rs.1000 which was paid by the trust by cash. Also the auto and doctor's fee payment was made by Urimai Kural Trust to the child's parent Sandhya by cash.

Project SOF Chennai

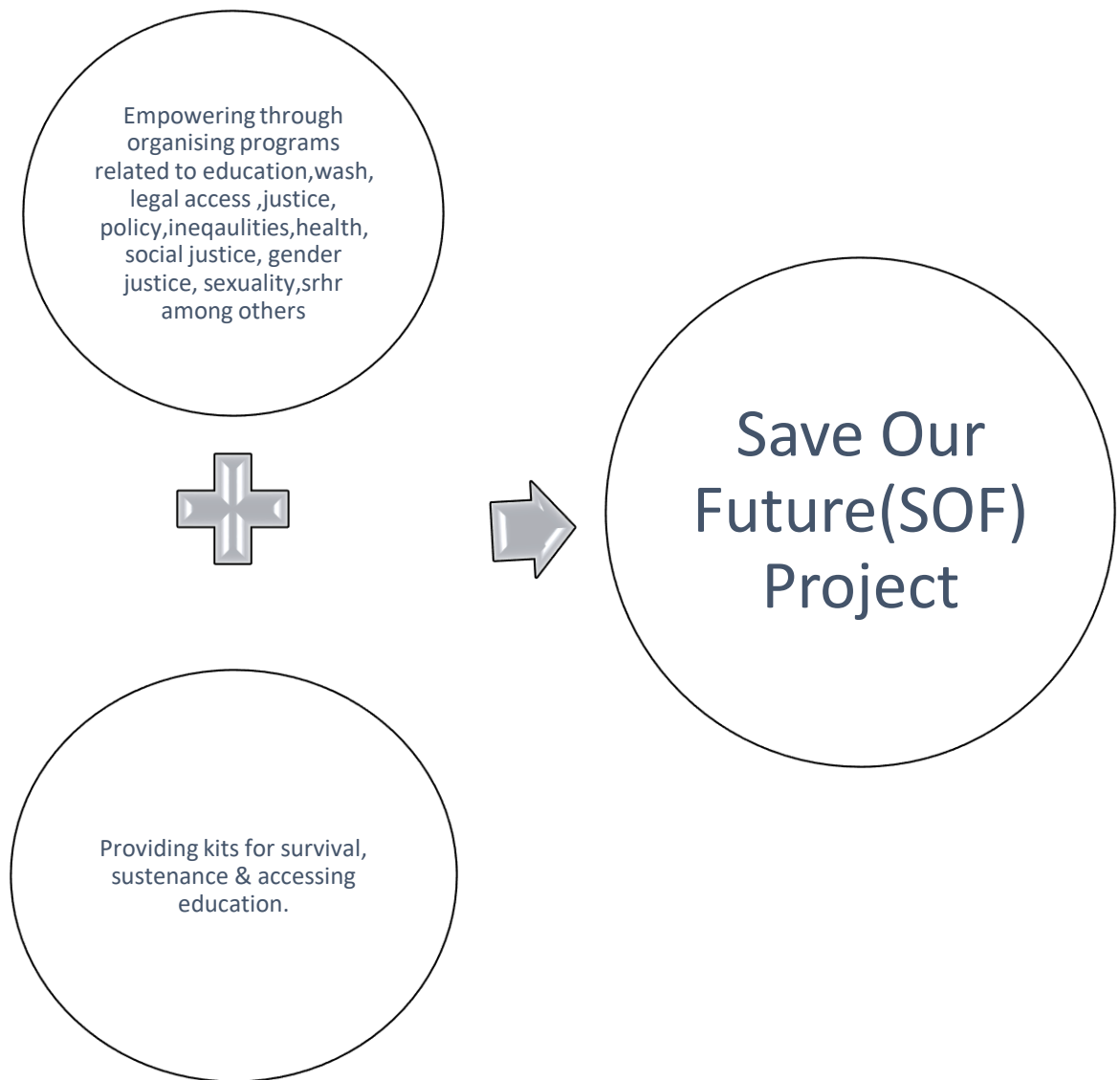
Even before our project began officially, 2 children from the roadside approached our director to buy them rice, onion, tomatoes, potatoes, paste, soap for them to survive for few days.

SOF (Save Our Future) as another perpetual project was chosen by Urimai Kural Trust because of director and volunteers who are willing to take the project to a varying degree. SOF is in line with UN SDGs 3, 4,5,6, 8,10,11, 16 & 17. The age-old disparities stemming from caste, class, gender, gender identity, sexual orientation manifests in educational attainments in the country. The building of aspirational capital, familial capital, social capital, navigational capital & resistant capital is the ulterior motive of this perpetual project.

India as one of the World's largest and most growing economies, faces significant challenges in its education system. According to Unified District Information System for Education (UDISE) 2021 – 2022 around 3.5% of children aged 6 to 13 were out of school. Factors like poverty, inadequate infrastructure, lack of clean water, sanitation, gender bias, prevailing gender norms, caste status of children, child labour, early marriages of girl children, gender identity, sexual identity forces children to drop out.

A 2017 study based on 36 in-depth interviews conducted in Bengaluru, revealed that girls were kept at home for fear of rape, harassment and abduction after puberty. Parents are less motivated to invest in girls' education because they would be married off. Apart from household characteristics, the socio-political nature of the community also influences schooling access and school-going decisions.

A 2018 UNICEF report based on surveys conducted in 77 countries (India is one among the 77 countries) which contributes to 51% global population on urban poor children reveals shocking data on urban inequalities which limits access to essential services like education, health, infrastructure, access to water, sanitation, immunization, birth registration, stunting, child mortality among others.



A 2019 report by UNESCO, New Delhi after surveying 371 sexual and gender minority youth in Tamil Nadu revealed that 60% and 50% were victims of bullying in middle school/high school and higher secondary school. 43% sexually harassed during their primary schooling years, 33.2% discontinued school.

SOF had its 1st program namely Workshop on Right to Education Act, 2009 India in socio-economically disadvantaged zone of Rukmini Nagar, Adyar. 10 families attended the event. Advocate Krishna Kumar was the resource person who presented about the law and policies around education in India & Tamil Nadu. 3 families consented to be photographed and our director, Mr. Fred Rogers distributed stationary kits to 5 children. Photographs attached after seeking parental consent. The outcome of today's workshop was the families who attended the event today were not aware of RTE, India.

Creating awareness is the first step towards empowerment. Empowerment process is time consuming and is a process of ongoing change to expand one's aspirations, strengthen their voice and exercise more choice.

After the 1st program concluded, a grade 10 student approached our trust director and sought help regarding exam kit for their approaching board exams (Exam kit included writing pad, pencils, erasers, sharpeners, geometry box, clear pouch, log book, ruler, pens, colour pencils, sketch colours, calculator). Director got the exam kit on 16th January 2025 for Rs.2000/- by paying cash.









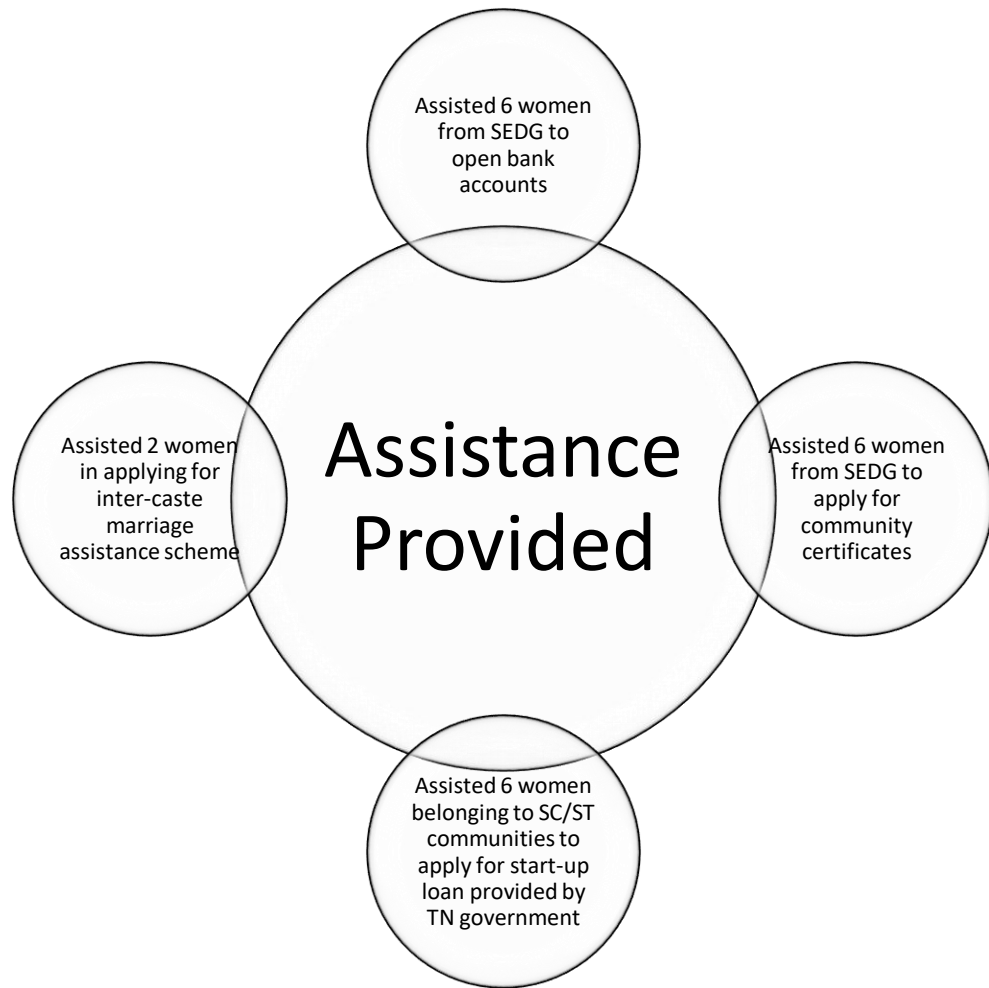


Women Liberation Justice

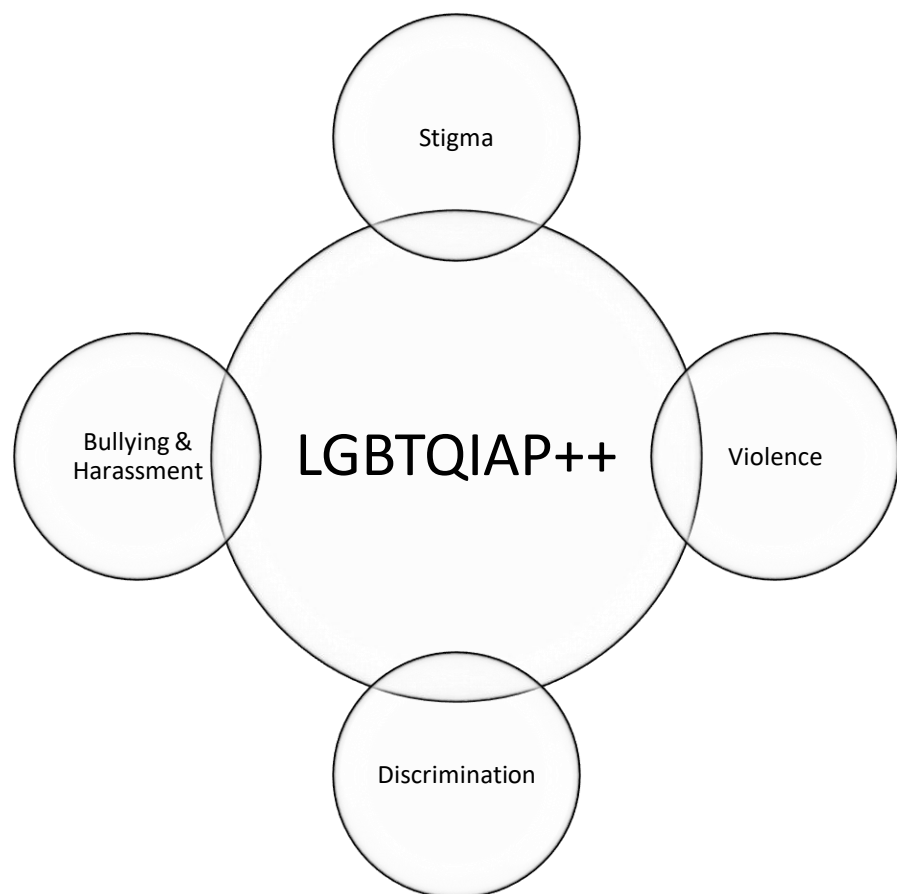
Gender equality in India is the most desired state of form, which our Nation is craving to have for long. Women are one among the marginalized sections of Indian society. Deeply embedded in patriarchal structures and practices have contributed to India ranking 123 out of 189 countries in the UNDP Gender Inequality Index (GII) 2020 and 140 out of 156 countries in the year 2021.

Violence against women is a violation of their basic human rights. It affects their mental, physical, sexual well-being. It prevents them from fully participating in the society and workforce. With increasing unemployment, restriction to access education, discriminatory attitudes exhibited by family & society, restriction on decision making, restriction on autonomy gender equity and gender equality remains a distant dream.

We at Urimai Kural trust helped 2 women from socio-economically disadvantaged groups who faced dowry harassment from in-laws and domestic violence from spouse respectively with legal aid pro-bono. Legal support, lawyers were sourced from intersectional volunteer run groups across Tamil Nadu. This is in line with Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR), Convention on the Elimination of all forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW), International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (ICCPR), International Covenant on Economic, Social & Cultural Rights (ICESCR) & Constitution of India.



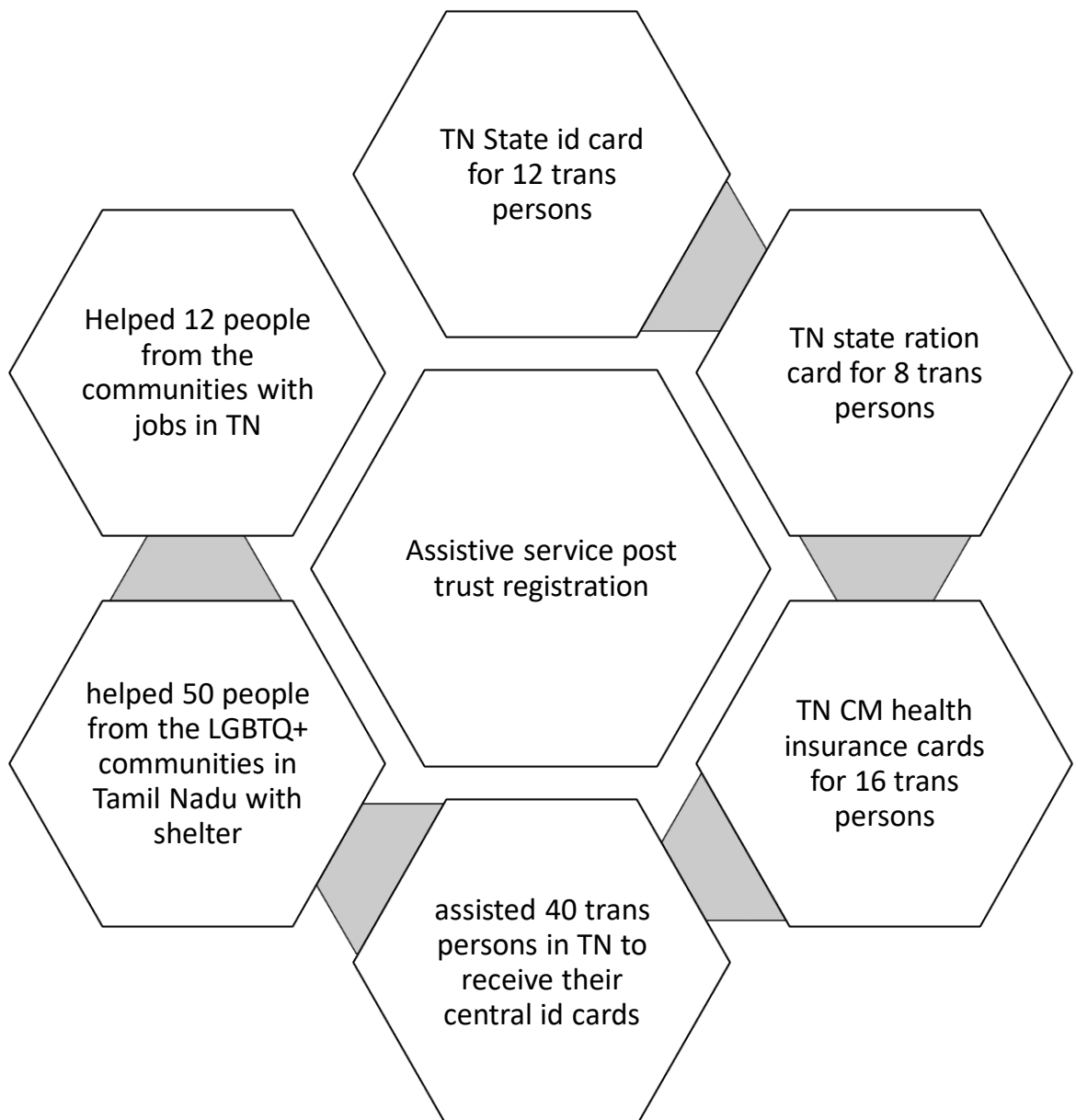
LGBTQIAP+ communities



We all take immense pride in India's rich cultural history and human evolution. Human evolution in itself is dynamic in nature. Yet India's LGBTQIAP+ communities face harassment, bullying, stigma, violence, abuse owing to gender, gender identity, gender expression,

sexuality identity. This prejudice and manifestations is evident in our natal families, educational institutions, workplaces, restroom usage, inpatient/outpatient medical care, shelter, employment. Collectively this violence leads to gender non-conforming children, children and young people who belong to LGBTQIAP+ dropping out of educational institutions and forced to take up menial jobs for sustenance.

Our Urimai Kural Trust's vision, mission is to work for every other marginalized community in India. Our work with the LGBTQIAP+ communities plays a crucial role as lgbtqiap+ communities are marginalized of the marginalized. With an intersectional approach, we have assisted communities in various spheres.



Advocacy in Healthcare for TGD communities

Worldwide, TGD people commonly experience transphobia, stigmatization, ignorance, and refusal of care when seeking health care services, which contributes to significant health disparities. TGD people often report having to teach their medical providers how to care for them due to the latter's insufficient knowledge and training. Intersectional forms of discrimination, social marginalization, and hate crimes against TGD people lead to minority stress. Minority stress is associated with mental health disparities exemplified by increased rates of depression, suicidality, and non-suicidal self-injuries than rates in cisgender populations. Professionals from every discipline should consider the marked vulnerability of many TGD people. WPATH urges health care authorities, policymakers, and medical societies to discourage and combat transphobia among health care professionals and ensure every effort is made to refer TGD people to professionals with experience and willingness to provide gender-affirming care.

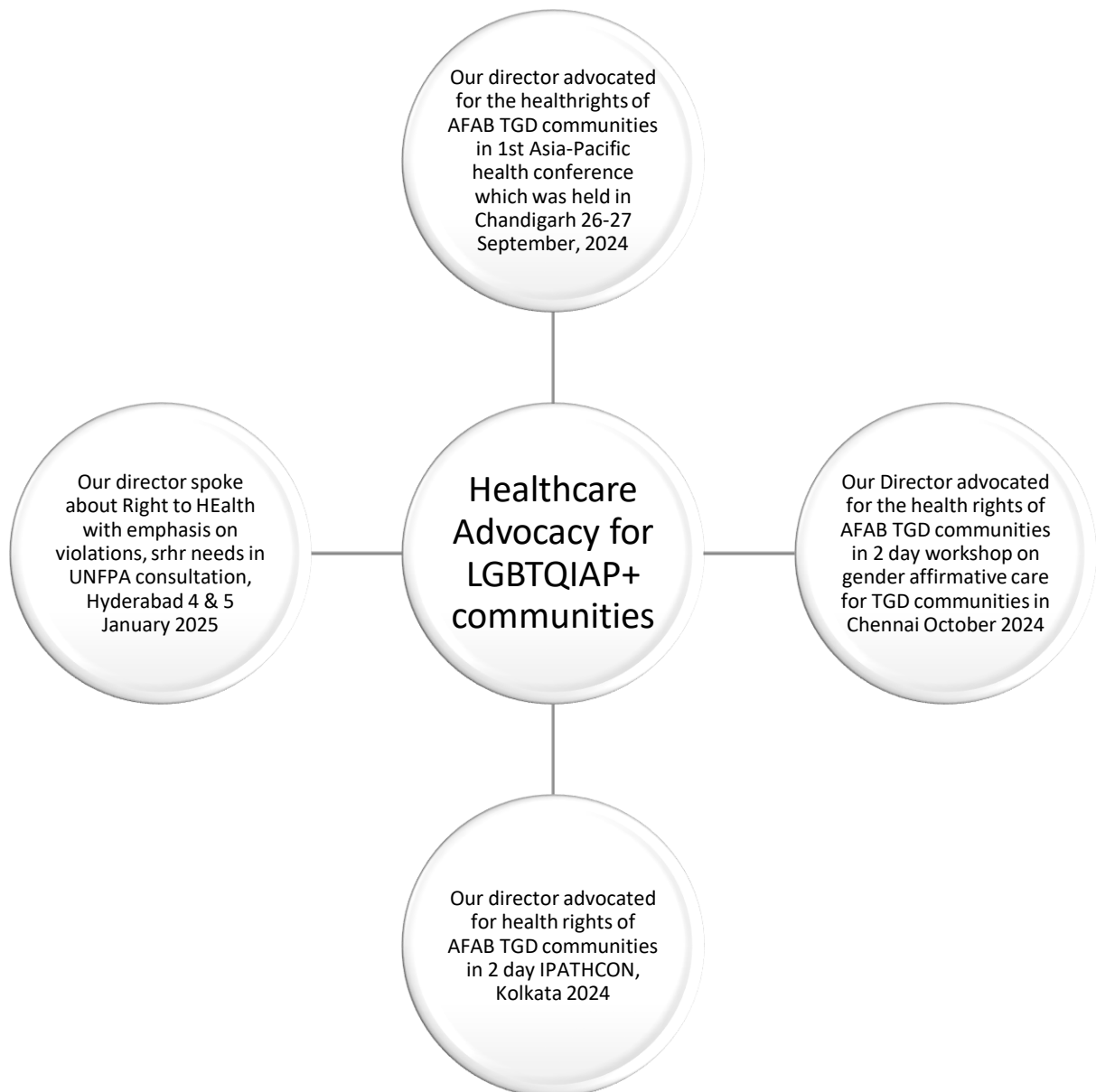
Transgender health care is greater than the sum of its parts, involving holistic inter- and multidisciplinary care between endocrinology, surgery, voice and communication, primary care, reproductive health, sexual health and mental health disciplines to support gender-affirming interventions as well as preventive care and chronic disease management. Gender-affirming interventions include puberty suppression, hormone therapy, and gender-affirming surgeries among others. It should be emphasized there is no 'one-size-fits-all' approach and TGD people may need to undergo all, some, or none of these interventions to support their gender affirmation. These guidelines encourage the use of a patient-centered care model for initiation of gender-affirming. Ideally, communication and coordination of care should occur between providers to optimize outcomes and the timing of gender-affirming interventions centered on the patient's needs and desires and to minimize harm. In well-resourced settings, multidisciplinary consultation and care coordination is often routine, but many regions worldwide lack facilities dedicated to transgender care. For these regions, if possible, it is strongly recommended that individual care providers create a network to facilitate transgender health care that is not available locally.

Due to a lack of knowledgeable providers, untimely access, cost barriers and/or previous stigmatizing health care experiences, many TGD people take non-prescribed hormone therapy. This poses health risks associated with the use of unmonitored therapy in potentially supratherapeutic doses and the potential exposure to blood-borne illnesses if needles are shared for administration. However, for many individuals, it is the only means of acquiring medically necessary gender-affirming treatment that is otherwise inaccessible. Non-prescribed hormone use should be approached with a harm-reduction lens to ensure individuals are connected with providers who can prescribe safe and monitored hormone therapy.

SOP for medical treatment of transgender persons released by the DGHS through F.No.Z.28017/43/2024-SAS-iii(FTS 8281793) dated 03-09-2024 has been sent back to the committee members for their inputs based on our trust director's representation.

Our director has also filed a PIL in the Hon'ble Madras High Court asking the Tamil Nadu Govt's health ministry to frame technical and operational protocols and guidelines for gender affirmative care (including procedures like mental health care, hormone therapy, surgeries etc.) for transgender persons based on World Professional Association for Transgender Health's latest Standards of Care (which is updated every few years) The Transgender Persons (Protection of Rights) Act, 2019 under Section 15 also mandates that all governments have to bring out a 'Health Manual' based on WPATH

guidelines, have to facilitate access for transgender persons to healthcare among other provisions. There are more than two clinics which are being run by the Tamil Nadu govt in its government hospitals, however transgender persons are facing barriers and discrimination in accessing gender affirmative care both in public and private sector. At the moment, the guidelines being followed are not as per WPATH updated standards of care in both public and private healthcare. This results in problems such as performing unethical and medically unnecessary examinations (like two finger tests), lack of informed consent, seeking parental consent affidavit even when the person is an adult, commenting inappropriately about the person's sexual orientation, gender identity, expression and lack of healthcare professionals' adequate knowledge on SOGIESC (sexual orientation, gender identity & expression, sex characteristics).

2 Day consultation on Transmasculine movement in Southern India

UKT co-organized a 2-day consultation on the transmasculine movement in Southern India with SAATHII which was held in Savera Hotel on 18 January 2025 and 19 January 2025.



Participants were assigned female at birth (afab) transgender and gender diverse(tgd) activists from 5 South Indian states namely Kerala, Tamil Nadu, Karnataka, Andhra Pradesh and Telangana. Most of the participants attended for 2 days and were arranged stay, breakfast, lunch, refreshments and dinner in Savera hotel with the help of SAATHII. Conversations about AFAB TGD communities and their inclusion, issues were discussed broadly. Our trust Director Mr. Fred Rogers as a man of transgender experience, participated and contributed to the event. UKT spent for the printer to be bought from SAATHII office to the consultation venue through porter app. Though the app showed only Rs.400 as charges, the porter person took Rs.500 as their charge for bringing printer safely.
